From Our Pastor

Dear Friends,

The six-week Lenten season is now concluding as we walk through Holy Week and prepare for Easter Sunday. I love the rhythm of this time in the Christian life, as we are invited to join Jesus and the disciples in the upper room in Jerusalem and partake of that Passover meal together. "This do, remembering me," takes on an immediacy, a tangible reality for me as we gather around the table and share Christ's bread and cup. Looking upon the cross at the time of Christ's death (the gospels suggest it was noon) as we gather for Good Friday, always stops me in my tracks. And whether the lectionary text brings Jesus's last words of forgiveness or cry of forsakenness, something in me feels the whole world stop as that scripture is read.

The joy of Easter morning is palpable for me. Every year I long to hear the words again: "Jesus Christ is risen!" And the response, "He is risen, indeed!" In those words - that declaration of Christ's resurrection - I always feel new energy unleashed upon the world and within my spirit. In recent years at Trinity we have included a brass ensemble in our Easter worship, joyously proclaiming with the bright tone of those instruments the victory and triumph of the empty tomb. The sights and sounds of Easter in the beloved community of Jesus Christ stir my soul, reinvigorating the call to discipleship. As with the early church, which baptized new believers on Easter morning, my life as a follower of Christ undergoes a new beginning every Easter.

As we journey through Holy Week to Easter, I pray for each of us to receive the transforming power of God in Jesus Christ as we know the intimacy of Christ's compassion at the table, as we know the saving power of his suffering love on the cross, and receive the promise of eternal life and everlasting love in the empty tomb.

May the deep and lasting joy of Easter be upon us all.

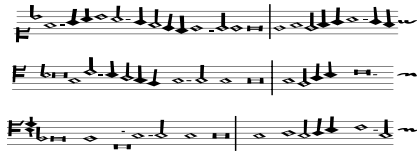

ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING TO BENEFIT THREE PROGRAMS

This Easter Trinity will be receiving one of the Presbyterian Church's (U.S.A.) most important and venerable special offerings: the One Great Hour of Sharing. It originated in 1949 as an ecumenical project to raise money for post-World War II relief and reconstruction. The name came from a radio special, a star-studded broadcast called "One Great Hour," used to promote the offering. Currently, nine denominations and the Church World Service of the National Council of Churches participate.

Trinity's collection will be allocated as follows:

--36 percent for the Presbyterian Hunger Program, much of which will be retained for work within the bounds of the Presbytery of Middle Tennessee.

--32 percent for Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, which is spearheading our denomination's Haiti relief efforts, among many other ministries.

--32 percent for Self-Development of People, a PC (U.S.A.) Program to provide aid to organizations of economically poor, oppressed and disadvantaged people.

April 25 -

As a young man imprisoned in a Nazi concentration camp, Simon Wiesenthal was taken one day to a hospital at the request of a mortally wounded Nazi soldier. Tormented by the crimes in which he had participated, the SS man wanted to confess to—and if possible, receive absolution from—a Jew. Wiesenthal left the room in silence, but remained intrigued by the issues the man’s request raised about the limits and possibilities of forgiveness.

Must we, can we, forgive the repentant criminal, no matter how heinous the crime? Can we forgive crimes committed against others? What do we owe the victims? Twenty-five years after the Holocaust, Wiesenthal asked leading intellectuals what they would have done in his place. The book, “The Sunflowers: On the Possibilities and Limits of Forgiveness,” presents Wiesenthal’s narrative of his experience, along with the responses of fifty people, including Archbishop Desmond Tutu, the Dalai Lama, Elie Wiesel, Harold Kushner, Primo Levi, and Nechama Tec. Our four-week series will situate this text in its historical context in World War II Europe, then move to a close examination of Wiesenthal’s question. What is forgiveness? Who has the authority to forgive? As Christians, are we called to forgive unconditionally? Is repentance necessary for forgiveness? As we consider the responses, we will also engage the biblical text as we seek our own answer to Wiesenthal’s

Business of the Presbytery

At the next meeting of the Presbytery on Thursday, May 6 at Donelson Presbyterian Church, David Carlton will serve as an elder commissioner. At this meeting, Linda Rogers will be formally recognized for achieving Level I Certification from the PC(USA) Administrative Personnel Association.

Standing Committee Reports

Administration and Finance Committee:

There is a surplus of \$6491 in the budget through February. An increase in a pledge was made this month, reducing the deficit in the 2010 budget. All but \$12,859 has been collected for capital campaign I, which closes June 30, 2010.

Building and Grounds Committee:

The Session approved continuing the Monday and Wednesday morning exercise classes, being held from 8:30 - 9:30 a.m. in the Fellowship Hall led by Linden Waldorf School parent, Margaret Sloan, comprised of approximately 11 attendees, roughly half from the school and half from the church. Allen Brown's sister-in-law, Jane Brown, a pre-school teacher at Westminster Presbyterian church, will hold a summer camp for three, or possibly, six mornings.

Christian Education Committee:

The annual Easter Egg Hunt will be held April 4 following worship, as will classes for all ages.

Community Ministries Committee:

Again this season, Howell Produce has offered to donate each day's culled produce, from both Green Hills' stands, to Martha O'Bryan Center. John Folger is organizing drivers. The Session approved asking the congregation to donate fresh fruit and vegetables to the Martha O'Bryan Center on the first Sunday of each month to coordinate with the celebration of Communion.

Trinity's participation in the Habitat Presbyterian Community Build, or another build was approved by the Session. The committee needs to raise \$2000 to supplement the \$3000 allocated in the Community Ministries budget.

Congregational Care Committee:

Fifteen members attended the first meeting of the committee. A notebook to record actions taken on behalf of care recipients has been started.

Fellowship Committee:

The Easter Breads celebration will be held April 4 beginning at 10:15 am. The Calypso Café catered luncheon will be

held on April 25 following the Jazz Worship service.

Growth and Membership Committee:

The Session approved the committee's review of membership rolls including actions regarding inactive status follow up and some deletions.

Personnel Committee

The hiring process for staffing youth ministry for next year is now underway. Heidi is in consultation with the Vanderbilt Divinity School's Field Education Office to explore candidates.

More Light Report

The *Out and About* Nashville newspaper has requested to write an article on Trinity's discernment process and decision to affiliate with More Light Presbyterians. The Session approved this request. Frances Duvall received a welcoming message from Michael Adee, More Light Presbyterian's Executive Director. Trice Gibbons, an elder at Second Presbyterian Church and moderator of the More Light Presbyterians Middle Tennessee Chapter, sent a card of rejoicing and congratulations from the chapter steering committee.

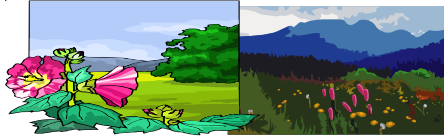
Nominating Committee

TREKKERS' WILDFLOWER WEEKEND SET FOR APRIL 30 AND MAY 1-2

The Great Smoky Mountain National Park truly is to me the Southern part of Heaven. Regardless of which hikes you take, the wildflowers will be spectacular and hopefully there will be some migratory warblers, tanagers, etc to brighten your day.

LODGING: We will stay at the Tally Ho Motel in Townsend, Tn (phone 800 448 2465). We have Cottage #2 rented so that we have a place to gather for dinner Friday night and for socializing, fun, games, etc. Please call and make your own reservations. Should the Tally Ho be full, the Best Western Valley View (865 448 2237) is a good alternative.

MEALS: We will have a cookout at Cottage #2 Friday night. Bring whatever meat you want and a dish to share with the group. BYOB and soft drinks.. The restaurant associated with the Tally Ho has pretty good breakfasts. For lunch Saturday plan to make sandwiches to take with you on your hike. For Saturday dinner, most go out as a group and some bring their own food.

HIKES: Friday afternoon we will go to the Middle Prong trail (past Treemont), leaving the motel about 1:30 EDT. If you arrive later, you can still meet us on that trail. On Saturday some go on a longer, high hike and others opt for a lower, shorter hike. The longer hike may be a repeat of the Laurel Falls/Little Greenbrier trail (7.4 miles) or this year we may do Russell Fields (10 miles, close to 3000 vertical feet gain) or Gregory's Bald (9 miles, 2200 vertical feet gain)

HIKING GEAR: For the high, longer hikes, you will definitely need boots or strong, high top walking shoes. A hat and a rain jacket are recommended, and you will need a back pack to carry lunch, water bottle, rain gear, etc. Binoculars and camera are optional. Insect repellent is recommended, as is sunblock.

Life is Beautiful (1997, Rated PG-13, 117 minutes)

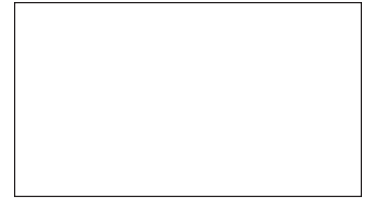
